Strongest-ever field for women's Indian Open

Last year, Laura Davies, a seven-time European Order of Merit winner, got her golf bag ready before the last off time but still managed to win the event.

With such interesting stories and popular memories of last year's event to think about, all the golf lovers must be waiting for the 2011 Hero Women's Indian Open eagerly.

With the legendary Laura in the lead, the fifth edition of the event, a co-organized event between the Ladies European Tour, the Ladies Asian Golf Tour and the Women's Golf Association to India, to be played at DLF Golf and Country Club from December 9 to 11 will see the

strongest ever field to have assembled in the country.

Although the biggest star of the \$300,000 event, Davies might not be the only one to play, as she is expected to land in India later this month; there was no dearth of talent and glamour at the pre-event conference as biggest Europeans as well as Asian stars graced the occasion.

To begin with, there will be defending冠军Caroline Hedwall who, having already won three events this year and leading the race to become the Rookie of the Year, is currently placed at the third position on money list. But the Swede is not ready to stop and is hoping to clinch her fourth trophy at the

Indian Open this week to rise to the second spot. "It is one of those years where I didn't expect it to turn out in this way but I did. I played very good amateur golf and then won three titles in my rookie year, which is amazing," said Hedwall, who was part of the Solheim Cup winning team for Europe.

"I am satisfied with this year and I'm hoping to have two good weeks and take

Melina down from the second place. It seems impossible to catch up with Ai (Miyazawa). So I am hoping to catch at least second," she added.

If Hedwall wins there is charm with her achievement, there were Christia Rini (USA) and Suniti Mehra (India) to entertain you with their bubbly and humour. The Indian challenge will be led by Sharmila Nicollet, the current leader on the domes-

tic Hero Women's Professional Golf Tour. Melina and talented Nakki Singh Sodhi.

"It has been a tough year for me. I changed my coach. That came along with my swing and had to change that as well. I am still working on my swing and hoping to get it right this weekend," Nicollet said.

Being the most renowned pro on Indian circuit, Melina, who was also the first ever Indian woman golfer to play at the LPGA tour, advised all the young Indian players to see themselves as a "representative of the country."

"The most important thing for the young golfer to learn from this event is how to be a representative for not only themselves but also for your country," Melina advised.
