Thidapa, Derrey hit the front

Vani, Gauri tied 13th on day one

NEW DELHI: Thailand's Thidapa Suwarnapura and Valentine Derrey of France shot identical six-under 66 to lead the field by two strokes on the opening day of the \$30,000 Hero Women's India Open at the Delhi Golf Club on Thursday.

Hannah Jun of the USA was at third place with a four-under 68, while Europe's rising star and youngest professional in the tournament, 17-year-old Charley Hull was three shots behind the leaders at fourth place.

However, none of the Indian women could finish the day in top 10. Gurgaon's Vani Kapoor and local amateur Gauri Monga were the best among the home players with a score of one-over 73 each to finish the day in tied 13th position.

With a warm and sunny day rendering perfect conditions for golf, Thidapa, one of the three Thai girls to play on the US Tour, played with aggression by knocking in seven birdies. A bogey on the seventh hole was the sole aberration in the game of the 21-year-old, who starting from the 10th tee, sunk birdies in 11th, 13th and 16th holes and continued in the same vein in the back nine with birdies at the first, fourth and sixth holes. She evened out her bogey at the seventh by hitting a birdie on the eighth.

"I think it was excellent driving that made my day. The course is very challenging and

you have to be very careful out here," said Thidapa, who is chasing her maiden victory on the Ladies European Tour.

"This is my third attempt at the Indian Open. Last year, I finished 13th. I am expecting to bridge the gap and take away the title," she said.

Breathing down her neck throughout the day was 26-year-old Valentine, who played a llawless round with three birdles on each turn of the course. "I played a practice was playing tough. Today, Itold myself to just keep control on tee shots. I did the same and all other things fell in place."

Vani, who started off with a birdie, pegged herself back with three bogeys. "It wasn't a bad round. This is DGC, and anything can happen here in the next two days."

Among other Indians, Neha

NEW DELHI: For a course considered tricky even by the best professionals, the greens at the Delhi Golf Course were quite benign on the first day of the Hero Women's Indian Open on

But while the tournament favourites failed to cash in on the bright sunshine and favourable conditions, Thidapa Suwannapura and Valentine Derrey raced ahead in the afternoon with impressive scores of sixunder 66 to be tied at the top after Round One.

Suwannapura, who finished tied 13th in the tournament last year, had seven birdies in her round.

Starting on the back nine, Suwannapura birdied the 11th, 13th and 16th holes before moving to the front nine for three more on the 1st, 4th and importantly, a 6th before dropping a shot on the par-three 7th hole. But she recovered immediately to birdie the next.

Good strategy Her strategy to only keep the

ball in play paid off. "Given the kind of tough course it is, you cannot afford to hit into the trees. You will

end up tearing your shirt. "So I was only thinking of hitting straight. I don't even know my final score, but I didn't expect such low scores," the LPGA regular said after fin-

ishing her round. Hitting straight was the trump card for Derrey as well. The 66 is the lowest ever she has shot in her career so far, and the Frenchwoman was expectedly happy

round. Derrey was hopeful of continuing the charge on the second day.

Unexpected scores

The scores were not expected when the best performance in the morning was a four-under by Hannah Jun of USA. Jun, playing in her second Indian Open, hardly used her driver, just like everyone else.

I hit a lot of birdie putts but on this course, a driver is hardly useful. It's more about accuracy on the tough and tight fairways than power," she said.

Seventeen-year old Charley Hull of England, in contention for the Ladies European Tour's Rookie of the Year award, was placed fourth with a 69. Veteran Sophie Gustafson of Sweden was one-under for the day while Frenchwoman Gwladys

Nocera shot three-over.

Vani Kapoor and Gauri Monga led the Indian hopes with one-over 73 on the first day to be placed tied 15th.

I made a couple of mistakes today but I am satisfied with the start I have made.

There is nothing drastic I need to change, just fine-tune my game a bit for the next

Frenchwoman shoots 66 to share lead with Thailand's Thidapa after Round 1

ALENTINE Derrey of France and Thailand's Thidapa Suwannapura made a blistering start at a "challenging" Delhi Golf Club (DGC) as they shot a six-under 66 each to share the lead after the first round of the Hero Women's Indian Open golf tournament on Thursday, US golfer Hannah Jun was third, two strokes

behind the leaders. Ladies European Tour 69 to be one stroke ahead of Thai Totiya Plucksataporn and South Korean Bo-Mi Suh, and two strokes in front of Swede Sophie Gustafson, a multiple winner on LET.

Indians golfers failed to make most of the home conditions as none of them shot an under or evenpar round in relatively easy conditions. The best Indians were Gurgaon girl Vani Kapoor and local amateur Gauri Monga, who shot a one-over 73 each to end the day in the tied 13th position.

Vani & Gauri are tied 13th while Sharmila 47th at

Neha Tripathi, winner of the order of merit on the domestic tour, shot two-over 74 for 36th position while Sharmila Nicollet, India's only golfer to have a card on the LET, failed to live up to her billing. After a card of three-over 75, she is languishing at 47th position, one stroke better than amateur Aditi Ashok and two ahead of a pack of stalwart Smriti Mehra, Ankita Tiwana, Rhea Nair and amateurs Gursimar Badhwal and Millie Saroha

Valentine, 26, who is yet to register a win on the LET, didn't drop a shot throughout the day in a round that was decorated six birdies. The Frenchwoman found the course to be tough when she practiced on Wednesday but said that patience paid dividends on Thursday. "I practiced yesterday and felt that narrow fairways make this course quite challenging. Today, I told myself not to be aggressive and keep patience. I

kept the tee shots on fairways and other things fell in place Thidapa, who finished 13th at

the Indian Open last year, seemed to start from where he had left, as she made seven birdies while dropped just one shot at the "challenging" DGC. The 21-year-old golfer started from the 10th and dropped just
