Nocera in lead, Indians in hot pursuit

NEW DELH: Back when it was first co-sanctioned by the Ladies European Tour (LET) only three indians made the cut at the Women's Indian Open, two of whom were amateurs. Cut to four years later, and one of those two amateurs, now in her rookie year as a professional, is vying with a former LET Order of Merit winner for the top honours.

In its eighth year now, the women's national Open is yet to see an Indian golfer lift the trophy Scratch the surface, though, and there's plenty of promise

— the number of Indians who have made the cut has increased progressively since the tournament's inclusion in LET's schedule in 2010. That 10 Indians will play on Saturday, nine of them for money, becomes more impressive when one takes into account the tough conditions at the Delhi Golf Club on Priday.

After an opening round that saw low scores across the board — including a course record nine-under-par 63 by Gwladys

While defending champion Inlidapa Suwannapura of Thai-land is in sole third position after a two-under 71, local star Sharmila Nicollet jumped to tied fourth with a similar score. She shares the spot with England's Holly Clyburn (75) and Hannah Burke (71) and Belgium's Chioe Leurquin (73), four strokes behind Vaishavi.

Nocera leads, Vaishavi stays in title contention

France's Gwladys Nocera continued to stay on top of the leaderboard, though her lead was cut down to two strokes, on the penultimate day of the \$300,000 Hero Women's Indian Open golf tournament here on Friday

On a day when most of the golfers struggled on the greens of the pat-73 Delhi Golf Course, Nocera followed up her opening round's 64 with a decent one-under 72 even as Noida golfer Vaishavi Sinha stayed in contention with a two-under 71. After 36 holes, Vaishavi has a total of eight-under 138, two slots behind Nocera.

The cut fell at six-over 152, with 66 pros — including 10 Indians — making the money round.

Unlike her opening day fireworks, Nocera found

Vaishnavi inches closer to Gwladys

NEW DELHI: A day after setting a new course record. Gwladys Nocera had a reality check on day two of the Hero Women's Indian Open here on Friday. struggling to find her lines and barely managing to stay ahead.

With a one-under 72 score for the day. Gwladys now has a two-day total of 10-under 136, just two strokes ahead of Indian youngster Vaishavi Sinha. Defending champion Thidapa Suwannapura of Thailand was a further three shots behind, but is still in with a chance to win the title on the final day.

After the cut was applied at 60 eight Indians made it to the final round. Three of them -Vaishnavi Sharmila Nicollet and Gursimar Badhwal - have kept themselves in the hunt to become the first Indian winner in the event's eighth edition.

Gwaldys, who started the day with a bogey on the fourth hole, birdied the next. But, the conditions on the front-nine - she birdied the ninth for her only other under-par hole - convinced her to playconservatively. She parred the entire back-nine, including a long putt on the 16th, to save the round.

"My driving was good but I didn't putt well. The pin positions were a lot tougher as it's a tough course. I am not thinking of my score at the moment, I will just go out and play my game tomorrow (Saturday) and hope for the best," said Gwladys later. Vaishavi, on the other

She repeatedly went off the fairways and had to fall back on her chipping and putting to get back into the game.

Sharmila, on the other hand, was left rueing another bad ending to a great day. The Bangalore golfer has been working on hitting the ball straighter. and it has worked for her here. However, inconsistency has let her down. She eagled the eighth

hole to go two-under on the front-nine, but a birdie-bogey finish dashed her hopes.

Gwladys maintains lead but Vaishavi remains strong contender

Playing steady golf Vaishavi Sinha shot Zunder?It to stay put at the second place as overnight leader Gwladys Nocera (France) carded a flawless one under 72 and managed to remain on the top of the leader board with a two-day total of 10-under in the Hero Women's Indian Open here today.

Vaishavi, with a subdued 71 had a two-round score of eight-under that leaves her two strokes adrift of Nocera going into the third and final round tomorrow.

The Indian teeing off from the 10th hole, sunk three birdies on the 11th, 13th and 18th and a bogie on the 12th, On the turn she scored two more birdies on the 1st and 2nd, but two back-to-back bogies cancelled out the gains leaving her at two-under for the day, which was enough to retain sole second place on the board.

Vaishavi, who will turn 24 on Saturday is looking forward to give herself the biggest birthday present in her golfing career. But she is aware of what lies ahead in the decider tomorrow.

"Yesterday I hit 12 greens. My hitting was a lot worse today and it was quite frustrating because I didn't miss greens just on the edge, I was missing way left and they were wild shots, somy short game was really good today. I hit 25 putts, which was the same as yesterday." she said.

The biggest gainer on the day, however, was Ban-galore based Sharmila Nicolet. From tied 10th place after Round 1, the lanky Indian moved into tied fourth with a card of two-under. However, her soorceard doesn't reflect her aggressive play that saw her sink an eagle on the 6th. She also unfortunately unforton by four bogies spread evenly or either side of the turn.

"Istarted badly, the game picked up as the day progressed. My putting improved and my driving was pretty precise. But the



pin positions were tough and I played a mix of attacking and conservative game. As for tomorrow you never know, I will be going for a win," said Nicollet.

Compared to the fireworks in Round I that saw Nocera return an error-free card, the French golfer had a much more subdued outing today. The Former LET Order of Merit winner dug deep into here experience to score two birdies and a bogey. The highlight of her play today was her ability to extricate herself from difficult situations, especially on hole nos. 14 and 16.

"ThinkI did reasonably well given that I didn't putt too well. I took 33 putts. Today, the pin positions were tough and pretty tricky. It was easy to make mistakes. Thankfully, my driving and iron play were good," said Nocera.
